We're dealing with the follow-up from the MPO/TMA Recertification (I can't release details, but I can tell you I'm very, very proud of the Statewide Planning team).

So much information, with more arriving every day. Today. we will have access to some historical data - you might find it interesting to explore the <u>1950 Census data</u>, released April 1 by the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) for the first time.

Grant Deadlines

April 8 <u>USDA Forest Service Urban & Community Forestry</u> "Messaging Urban and Community Forestry for All" Program seeks proposals for program development/ collaboration to address urban and community forest public awareness and education.

April 13 <u>Regional Conservation Partnership Program</u> from the NRCS addresses natural resource challenges on agricultural land for projects that address climate change, benefit historically underserved producers, and support urban agriculture.

April 14 <u>RAISE Transportation Discretionary Grants</u> U.S. DOT's Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) program helps communities carry out projects with significant local or regional impact.

April 15 <u>Community Placemaking Grants</u> enable nonprofits and government agencies to address inequality of access to public spaces; awards of \$40,000 are available for physical and programmatic improvements to a public space from the Project for Public Spaces.

April 19 <u>Rural Community Development Initiative Grants</u>help develop rural capacity and ability to undertake projects related to housing, community facilities, or community and economic development. The recipients will, in turn, provide programs that will support their communities.

April 19 <u>Rural Innovation Stronger Economy (RISE) Grant Program</u> offers grant assistance to create and augment high-wage jobs, accelerate the formation of new businesses, support industry clusters and maximize assets in low-income rural areas.

April 21 <u>Challenge America</u> grant from the National Endowment for the Arts offers support primarily to small organizations for projects in all artistic disciplines that extend the reach of the arts to populations that are underserved.

April 25 <u>Apprenticeship Building America Grant Program</u>will strengthen, modernize, expand and diversify its Registered Apprenticeship Program to enable more workers to earn while they learn and find reliable pathways to the middle class.

April 28 <u>Energy Transitions in Underserved Communities</u>. The U.S. EPA is seeking applications proposing community-engaged research that will address the drivers and environmental impacts of energy transitions in underserved communities.
