RI Freight Plan Update



Last month, the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) approved the Rhode Island Freight and Good Movement Plan, 2022 Interim Update ("Freight Plan"). FHWA's approval enables Rhode Island to continue to use federal freight transportation funds for projects that improve the State's ability to move freight. Over the past year, the Division of Statewide Planning has worked closely with the Rhode Island Department of

Transportation and the State Planning Council's Freight Advisory Committee to update the Freight Plan, which was originally drafted in 2017.

As part of this update, staff addressed many new planning requirements for state freight plans that were specified in the recently passed Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (also referred to as the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law) in November 2021. The new federal requirements include addressing e-commerce impacts on freight infrastructure, consideration of military freight, goals and strategies to decrease the impacts of extreme weather and disasters, freight impacts on local air pollution, freight impacts on flooding and storm water runoff, and freights impacts on wildlife habitat loss. In addition, a state's freight plan must also address how it enhances the reliability or redundancy of the freight transportation network and incorporate the ability to rapidly restore freight access and reliability after a disaster. **Read more...**

Census Bureau Invites Input for 2030 Census

The Census Bureau is in the early stages of planning for the next census, a process that includes years of research and testing to prepare for the complex task of counting every person living in the United States each decade. To improve the 2030 Census, the <u>U.S. Census Bureau</u> has invited the public to share their input and ideas; there is a ninety-day response window, with input due by November 15.



Public input is needed now so it can inform the Census Bureau's decisions on the initial operational design, along with the findings of dozens of research projects underway. With this input, the Census Bureau aims to better reach and count historically undercounted people, overcome challenges and encourage everyone to respond to the 2030 Census.

By mid-decade, in 2024, the Census Bureau expects to decide the initial operational design for the 2030 Census, or the "big picture" plan for the census. That milestone is followed by refining procedures and putting technology and other infrastructure in place for the national count in 2030.
