Our Year in Review



It was a busy and productive year for the staff at Statewide Planning. Here are some highlights:

- Continued to work with the East Bay communities of Barrington, Warren, and Bristol on a resiliency plan for Route 114 as part of our <u>Municipal Technical</u> Assistance Program;
- Partnered with the RI Department of Environmental Management (RIDEM) and the RI Resources Recovery Corporation (RIRRC) to begin drafting a request for

Action Strategy:

- Contracted with <u>Streetlight</u> to obtain bicycle and pedestrian data sets to assist with transportation planning efforts;
- Reviewed guidance for RI
 <u>Commerce's TOD Pilot Program</u>
 regulations and <u>RIHousing's</u>
 <u>Municipal Technical Assistance</u>
 Program;
- Met with thirty-six RI municipal planning directors and town planners to discuss the top issues in their community and how our office can provide assistance;
- Completed our <u>2023 Title VI Report</u>, as well as biannual Disadvantaged

- proposals for an updated <u>Solid</u> <u>Waste Management State Guide</u> <u>Plan</u> element;
- Continued development of a Social Equity Platform using federal data sets and ArcGIS Online to develop a mapping framework;
- Completed five amendments to the <u>2022-2031 STIP</u> to assist projects sponsored by the RI Department of Transportation (RIDOT), RI Public Transit Authority (RIPTA), and RI Turnpike and Bridge Authority (RITBA) to progress;
- Worked with ESRI to migrate the E-STIP to a new Experience Builder platform;
- Chose a consultant for the Rhode Island <u>Complete Streets</u> Plan;
- Served on multiple National
 Cooperative Highway Research
 Program <u>Transportation Research</u>
 Board (TRB) project panels,
 the <u>Eastern Transportation</u>
 Coalition (TETC) working groups,
 American Planning Association's
 (APA) Advisory Committee for solar
 energy siting, and the Board of
 the <u>RI Chapter of the APA</u>;
- Continued background research and work on RI Land Use 2050;
- Monitored 2023 legislation that impacted local, regional, and statewide planning, with scanning and tracking of 140 planningrelated bills;
- Trained 178 community board members from twenty-five communities as part of the <u>municipal educational program</u>;
- Began work on the 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) update, including interagency coordination and data collection;
- Served on steering committees and working groups for numerous plans, such as the RI Emergency Management Agency's (RIEMA) Hazard Mitigation Plan, the RIDOT Resilience Improvement Plan and <u>Carbon Reduction</u> <u>Strategy</u>, the <u>National Grid</u> <u>Northeast Medium-Heavy Duty</u> <u>Electric Highways Study</u>, the RI

- Business Enterprise (DBE) Uniform Reporting;
- Completed a draft limited update of the <u>Public Participation Plan</u>, to be finalized in the first half of 2024;
- Attended (and presented at)
 numerous conferences, including
 the TRB, the Southern New England
 Conference of the American
 Planning Association (SNEAPA), the
 Association of Metropolitan
 Planning Organizations (AMPO), the
 Northeast Arc Users Group
 (NEARC), and the National State
 Geographic Information Council;
- Conducted State Guide Plan consistency reviews for numerous local comprehensive plan draft updates and amendments;
- Began work with the City of East Providence on a bicycle and pedestrian plan;
- Partnered with RI Commerce on a new draft Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS), <u>Ocean State Accelerates</u>, and an accompanying <u>dashboard</u> to track progress on the plan's action items;
- Provided GIS mapping and data support to other state agencies and municipalities;
- Hired a Supervising GIS Specialist, a Supervising Planner for transportation, and a Principal Planner for transportation;
- Held four Planners' Roundtable
 Discussions to provide a forum for
 municipal planners to learn about
 impactful changes to legislation and
 share ideas with their peers;
- Continued to work with the <u>Office</u>
 of <u>Energy Resources</u> to provide
 technical planning assistance to
 municipalities on grid
 resiliency/capacity and storage;
- Provided RI planners and others with planning news, information, grant opportunities, events, and articles via our (mostly) monthly Plan RI newsletter;

Resiliency Technical Assistance Winner Announced



Statewide Planning recently launched our "Planning for a Resilient Community" Municipal Technical Assistance program, seeking applications from municipalities interested in a review of their bylaws, policies, and incentives that address land use, infrastructure, open space, stormwater, and flooding to assess their effectiveness in addressing resilience

against the effects of climate change.

We are pleased to announce that the Town of Cumberland has been chosen to receive the 2023 Resiliency Technical Assistance award. Cumberland Planning Director Glenn Modica says, "Cumberland is in the process of updating our *Hazard Mitigation Plan*, so we're very excited at the opportunity for the ordinance review to promote sustainable development and protect our natural resources."

This review will improve resilience to climate change and help reduce impacts to public infrastructure, private property, natural resources, and safety. As part of the award, regulation changes will be recommended and new regulations will be developed.

Grants & Deadlines

December 1 Rhode Island Council for the Humanities Major Grants intent to apply deadline for grants (\$2,000+) in support of public projects and documentary film/media projects that will begin after April 1, 2024.

December 6 Love Your Block helps communities identify projects and awards minigrants to support neighborhood-driven solutions that a community can implement.

December 6 <u>RIDEM Outdoor Recreation grant program</u> provides matching funds to cities, towns, and recognized tribes for the acquisition, development and renovation of outdoor recreational lands and facilities.

December 11 HOPE VI Main Street Program provides grants to small communities to assist in the renovation of historic or traditional central business districts by replacing unused commercial space with affordable housing units. (Deadline extended).

December 15 <u>RIDEM Climate Change Community engagement grants</u> offer up to \$40,000 each for community groups to engage directly with the EC4, state agencies, and consultants working to prepare Rhode Island's 2025 Climate Action Strategy.

December 15 <u>Tree City, Tree Campus, and Tree Line USA</u> deadline for community urban forest resources.

December 19 <u>Coastal Habitat Restoration and Resilience Grants</u> for Tribes and Underserved Communities will help support community-driven habitat restoration and build the capacity to more fully participate in restoration activities.

December 19 <u>FY24 Recovery Challenge Fund</u> helps to secure information about endangered or threatened species, to aid in their recovery, and to conserve the ecosystems upon which they depend.

December 31 National Fish Passage Program provides technical/financial assistance for dam removals, culvert replacements, floodplain restoration, and the installation of fishways.

December 31 <u>T-Mobile Hometown Grants</u> support small towns, villages, and territories with populations of less than 50,000 to build, rebuild, or refresh community spaces that help foster local connections.

December 31 Walmart Local Community Grants fund Community and Economic Development, Diversity and Inclusion, Education, Environmental Sustainability, Health and Human Service, Hunger Relief, Public Safety, and Quality of Life projects.

January 5 <u>Weatherization Program Assistance Enhancement & Innovation</u> program leverages resources and community partnerships for energy retrofits of low-income residential buildings.

January 9 Affordable Connectivity Outreach Grant Program provides funding from the FCC for resources needed to increase awareness of and participation among households most in need of affordable internet connectivity.

January 12 Community Forest and Open Space Conservation Program provides

financial assistance to Indian tribes, local governments, and qualified non-profits to establish community forests through fee simple acquisition of private forest land.

January 12 <u>Sustaining Cultural Heritage Collections</u> program helps cultural institutions preserve large holdings by supporting sustainable preventive measures that mitigate deterioration and strengthen institutions' ability to anticipate and respond to disasters.

January 14 Road to Zero Community Traffic Safety Grants support a Safe System approach to address traffic fatalities, disparities in mobility safety and access, and improve overall traffic safety.

January 16 <u>van Beuren Charitable Foundation</u> funds proposals to achieve measurable results, prioritizing Aquidneck Island and Newport County, but proposals from outside the region that benefit target communities are welcome.

January 26 <u>RIDEM Targeted Watersheds/Clean Water Act - Section 319</u> grants for preventing and/or abating water pollution associated with nonpoint sources and to improve or restore aquatic habitat.
