

Five-Year Comp Plan Implementation Report Reminder



The Rhode Island Comprehensive Planning and Land Use Regulation Act (§45-22.2-12) requires municipalities with an approved comprehensive plan submit an "informational report on the status of the comprehensive plan implementation program with the Division of Planning not more than five years from the date of municipal approval."

The purpose of this report is to ensure that municipalities are assessing their progress toward achieving the actions identified in their Plan's implementation program. It's

also a great opportunity to take stock of a municipality's progress toward Plan implementation.

The Act does not specify how the report should be presented but, as an aid, the Division has developed a suggested reporting template on our <u>Local Comprehensive Planning webpage</u>, where you will also find completed five-year reports from other Rhode Island communities and <u>a webinar</u> from our office about the reports. Please note that our template does not preclude municipalities from developing their own reporting format.

Our office greatly appreciates the opportunity to work with our municipal partners in the drafting of community comprehensive plans! Filing this report with Statewide Planning will allow us to look for areas where we could potentially offer communities trainings and future technical assistance on how to incorporate achievable goals into a Comp Plan.

Annual Planner Check-ins to Resume

It's almost time for staff from Statewide Planning to start scheduling our "chats" with municipal planners around Rhode Island. To stay connected to municipal planners in the State, RI Division of Statewide Planning staff started conducting these meetings with local planners to find out how they are doing, what they are working on, and how we can help them.



Statewide Planning started the now-annual visits in February 2021, as a way to connect during the Covid pandemic: to date, we we have held sixty-two chats with thirty-two communities. These chats are held virtually, in person at a municipal building, over coffee or, with one town planner, at a local burrito restaurant.

Please remember that Statewide Planning is always here for municipal planners for assistance with an issue or problem. As a result of our visits, we have helped local planners by: researching ordinances and regulations in other places; assisting with issues involving other State agencies; connecting planners who are working on similar projects in different municipalities; providing leads on potential funding sources; and much more.

American Community Survey 5-Year Migration Flows_

The U.S. Census Bureau recently released migration statistics from the 2016-2020 American Community Survey (ACS). These data tables highlight the geographic mobility of people between counties, metropolitan statistical areas, minor civil divisions in some states and municipalities (municipios) in Puerto Rico. The Census Flows Mapper tool

was also updated with the data.

Economic Census Will Survey More Than Four Million Businesses Starting This Week

Most people know that the U.S. Census Bureau measures the nation's population once every ten years; but fewer know that, every five years, it conducts another survey that measures the nation's businesses for a comprehensive measure of U.S. economic activity across more than 21,000 geographic areas. Letters for the 2022 Economic Census are scheduled to be mailed this week and will explain how business respondents can fill out the 2022 Economic Census questionnaires online. Responses from over four million business locations will provide data that paints a more complete picture of U.S. businesses at the national, state and local level. The statistics it collects will cover nineteen economic sectors and encompass 950 North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) industries.

Grants & Deadlines

February 6 Ocean State Adaptation and Resilience Fund (OSCAR) public comment deadline on Coastal Resources Management Council's proposed rulemaking. Comments by can be given orally or in writing during the comment period ending on Feb. 6.

February 6 National Culvert Removal, Replacement & Restoration Grants are for the replacement, removal, and repair of culverts or weirs that improve or restore fish passage for anadromous fish.

February 9 <u>NEA Grants for Arts Projects Program FY202</u>4supports opportunities for public engagement with the arts and arts education, and for the improvement of overall capacity and capabilities within the arts sector.

February 9 Newport County Fund Grants range from \$1,000 to \$10,000; nonprofit, 501(c) organizations, and municipal departments located and operating in Newport County are eligible to apply.

February 15 Rhode Island Cemetery Weeks proposals due. RIHPHC welcomes proposals for tours, conservation demonstrations, clean-ups, documentation projects, themed walks, lectures, and more.

February 17 <u>RI Forest Health Works Project</u> provides financial and technical assistance to help conserve forest lands and their related benefits through two distinct paths for land protection. Contact <u>Brunilda.Velez@usda.gov</u> for more information.

February 24 The National Fund for Sacred Places letter of interest (LOI) deadline. The Fund provides matching grants of \$50,000 to \$250,000 to congregations undertaking significant capital projects at historic houses of worship.

February 27 Partners for Places Grant Program provides grants of \$75,000- \$180,000 to create/improve collaborative partnerships between local government sustainability and/or water departments, frontline community partners, and place-based funders.

February 28 <u>RAISE (Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity)</u>
U.S. DOT grants help complete critical freight and passenger transportation infrastructure projects at state and municipal levels, Tribal governments, and others.

February 28 RI Wild Plant Society offers grants up to \$2,500 to aid in the study of wild plants and their habitats. Recipients must be an educator, a member of a RI botanical or environmental association, or a student in botany or environmental related studies.

February 28 <u>Rural Business Development Grant</u> provides technical assistance and training for small rural businesses that have fewer than fifty new workers and less than \$1 million in gross revenue.
